

PROMOTING THE DIGNITY AND WORTH OF PEOPLES

Promoting The Dignity And Worth Of Peoples is the second of a series of four reports on The Global Agenda for Social Work and Social Development. It is being launched at the 2016 World Conference on Social Work and Social Development in Seoul Korea by The International Association of Schools of Social Work (IASSW), The International Council on Social Welfare (ICSW) and The International Federation of Social Workers (IFSW).

Respect for 'the dignity and worth of peoples' is the second pillar of The Global Agenda for Social Work and Social Development. The concept is at the heart not only of professional ethical codes but also of international conventions and statements on human rights and peaceful coexistence. These aspirational statements aim to shape environments in which people can live without fear, give expression to their identity and personality as they wish, whilst showing respect to others, care for their family and community members, practice their beliefs and religions, participate in and shape their communities through social as well as political engagement and have access to the resources needed for a dignified and secure life.

The report presents the findings of 5 Regional Observatories that have examined social work and social development practice related to this second pillar of *The Global Agenda for Social Work and Social Development*. These observations are set in the context of the social, political and economic realities of 2014-16.

A clear message from each of the regional reports is that sustainable development is best achieved by people and professionals working together with mutual respect: 'co-construction' of solutions to difficult issues involving those affected, whether by community, family or personal trauma, calamity, disaster or mistreatment. Those contributing to the Regional Observatory processes, reflecting wider experience, show that dignity and worth are respected when people have self-determination and influence over their own futures.

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
